A Stay-At Home Mom

The unwritten, generational rules on « How to Become a Strong Black Woman » are clear: 1. Get an education. 2. Work harder than everyone else. 3. Sacrifice for your children. 4. Never depend on a man-God bless the child who has her own.

So why is it that in 2001, many highly educated, highly employable black women have tossed their careers to the wind, opting to stay home and wholeheartedly depend on their men to support them? Some women say they're making the ultimate sacrifice by relinquishing their financial independence. But these stay-at-home moms say there is much more to life than earning the mighty dollar.

Staying at home allows them to personally teach their children to read, to write, to cook, to clean, to learn moral values and to have a strong sense of family and no measly career could ever take the place of that.

Contrary to the stereotype, many black stay-at-home moms are not privileged, or on welfare. Many are former career women who have made huge sacrifices to stay home and rear their children. Child care is a major issue for all mothers, and Chicago stay-at-home mom Evelyn Green, wife of Leroy Green, a Walgreens Pharmacist, often agonized over her decision to work after having her first child.

"After I had my child I had every intention of going to work, and for a while I put my child in a day care and rejoined the workforce." Green, a former office manager, recalls. "My maternal instincts were kicking in and I found myself crying on the train on the way to work because I've heard every baby-sitter horror story there is and I felt guilty about leaving my child."

So the Greens began to do some number crunching with the family budget and realized that Evelyn's return to the workforce didn't do much to improve their bottom line. Because her paycheck was spent on transportation to work, eating lunch at work, and of course, the baby-sitter, the family decided that it made much more sense for her to stay home, especially since that's where she wanted to be.
